SHELTER FROM THE STORM

My fingers were frozen, my wind blown body chilled to the core. I couldn't wait to get back home, out of the cold, out of the wind, to warm up again and have a good meal. I had been out with volunteers, packing straw into shelters for feral and homeless cats to sleep in, and replenishing their food and water. Counting my blessings, I felt such sadness for all the people and animals who have no warm place to rest, no way to feed the hunger. En route home, I passed block after block of rundown buildings, boarded up homes, and signs of poverty, interspersed with upscale restaurants and affluent neighborhoods. This scenario takes place right here in the Berkshires, and plays out across the United States.

Times are tough, but nothing

is harder than life on the streets or in the wild. Help us to help the thousands of abandoned and feral cats in Berkshire County—we are their only advocates! We go to where they are—in condemned buildings, vacant lots, junkyards and

barns, to provide them with food, warm shelter boxes, spay/neuter and veterinary care. Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) involves the humane capture and spay/neuter/vaccination of feral (wild) cats, so that they can peacefully live out their lives as the wild felines they are, without giving birth to any more kittens. Our dedicated volunteers are out in all kinds of weather, 365 days a year, caring for these forgotten felines. As more people lose financial footing in these hard times, more and more cats and kittens are being abandoned to fend for themselves in the wild. Today's abandoned pets (those that survive) will become tomorrow's feral cats. Please help us to continue fighting for these dignified animals that deserve so much better.

Recent Rescues

Albert was locked inside a boarded up building for three weeks.

Thankfully, the roof leaked so he was able to drink water, until finally, someone noticed him through a window. When Animal D.R.E.A.M.S. gained access to the building, Albert was too traumatized to come out of his hiding place inside a wall. We used a humane trap baited with tuna to lure him out, and once rescued, had him checked by a veterinarian and neutered. Albert has blossomed

into a mellow, lovable cat, has gained weight and is ready for a permanent home.

Too many of the cats we rescue, turn out to be abandoned pets. Though they seem wild at first, once their ordeal is replaced by our gentle care, they learn to trust again and become the most devoted, loving pets. As skinny as a runway model-lanky, bones protruding, he had been starving for quite some time. Each vertebrae jutted out, making his spine look spiked like a dinosaur. Eyes sunken, gums pale, I suspected he was a throwaway pet, acquired as a "free" kitten at the beginning of the summer, only to be left behind when the season ended.

Now, on this freezing November day, he has joined the ranks of the lucky ones; those who were found and rescued by Animal D.R.E.A.M.S. We immediately took him to a veterinarian, and tonight, he is purring on a fleece blanket next to the woodstove, taking small meals every two hours, as his ordeal becomes a distant memory.

Winter Tips



Use straw or hay to line cat shelters. Avoid blankets and towels-they will get wet and freeze, or become mildewed.

Remember to provide fresh lukewarm water as well as food. During these frozen months, cats have a hard time finding fresh water to drink.

Animal DREAMS is a not-for-profit 501(c)(3) organization dedicated to improving life for cats living on the streets or in the wild.


Our Wish List
